APRIL PROGRAM INFORMATION

Hybrid Sunday services start at 10:30. (Religious education classes are in-person only.) If you attend in person, **masks are optional**. Apr 2. Father's Day. Fathers are celebrated with their special day in June, a month when UUFSC doesn't have services. This service will be devoted to looking at fatherhood from several perspectives, including a speech by Phillip Spooner, a Maine father of four sons. What does fatherhood mean to you? Do you have a story about your father? Do you have a story about being a father? Join us and come ready to share, if you wish, as we continue our exploration of family. Led by Jeff Wallis.

Apr 9. Easter and Jesus: What to Think? In the 7th century, Bede observed that the Druids' Spring Equinox festival "was once called after a goddess of theirs named Eostre, in whose honor feasts were celebrated in that month." Our discussion of Easter will reflect on the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, the appropriation of Pagan "stuff" by early Christians, the man Jesus and his religious genesis, and the challenge of embracing life despite the specter of death. (At the beginning of the service, Rev. Doak will share a story with the children.) Led by Rev. Doak Mansfield.

Apr 16. The Depiction of Aging in Literature. Today's program will be about old age. No, I do not intend to tell you about my aches and pains, and how I've become a grumpy old man. Instead, with help from the Old Testament, Plato, Shakespeare, Tennyson, The Beatles, poetry written by some of our Fellowship members and friends, and maybe more, we will explore how old age is depicted in selected works of literature. Is an old person merely "a tattered coat upon a stick," as Yeats once wrote, or does old age bring wisdom or other attributes? Young people are welcome, for, if they're lucky, they too will get old. Led by Jerry Sattin.

Apr 23. We Are All Connected by Water. Since the Clean Water Act of 1972, there's been little improvement in water quality for NJ. Community engagement is most welcome in returning our watersheds to their former healthy state. In recognition and celebration of Earth Month, Chris will share her ideas and programs that can help us to reclaim the clean waterways we inherited from the Lenape. Led by Chris Dunbar.

Apr 30. "The God Talk." We'll explore thoughts on the person (idea) and place (role) of God in life. Jehovah, Allah, Father, The Force, Manitou...are some of its names. Does it signify in one's life? Led by Rev. Doak Mansfield.

Spring is here, a time to foster the spirit of renewal and awakening in our RE classes.

In March, the children finished their prayer bead necklaces. The beads are a simple reminder of the power of prayer—a bead for gratitude, a bead for remorse, a bead for loving prayers, and a bead for personal wishes.

In April, we'll add two more directions to our Moral Compass—empathy and forgiveness. On the second Sunday, the children will remain upstairs after lighting the chalice for a very special story time with Reverend Doak. Families are welcome to join us after the story for a special surprise outside!

Below is a preview of the RE calendar for the month of April.

Apr 2. In Another's Shoes. In this session, the children will continue learning the concepts of empathy, compassion, and understanding. They will listen to a story that sensitively deals with the topic of seal hunting. Afterward, the teachers and children will take turns imagining how they might feel if they were a seal that was hurt.

Apr 9. Easter Sunday. On this Sunday, we'll have an intergenerational service. Reverend Doak will ask the children to join him in the front of the sanctuary for a story. Afterward, we will head outside for an egg hunt!

Apr 16. In Another's Shoes (continued). This week, the children will learn about advocacy by writing letters and drawing pictures to send to Canadian officials who are considering outlawing seal products. If time remains, we'll practice being empathetic in an active listening activity with a partner.

April 23. Forgiveness. In this session, the children will hear a theatrical reading of a story, which takes place in Persia, about two friends and the power of forgiveness.

Apr 30. Forgiveness (continued). This week, the children will get to demonstrate how forgiveness can erase hurt by writing their own hurtful memories in sand and then quickly erasing them with their hand. Then, they'll get to etch a kind memory into clay, which will harden when it dries, to illustrate how the kindness of others stays in our hearts forever.

Stewardship


