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ALONG THE PATH



Dear Fellowship Friends,

Many years ago, a huge snapping turtle hauled herself/himself/themself out of our neighbor's pond and headed across our yard, on the grass and in the gulley, through the pipe that runs under the road and into a small stream that leads to Cabin Run Creek, which then pours into Tohickon Creek, and after many winding turns, flows into the Delaware River. The name Tohickon comes from the Lenape people who described the area as "Wood Area" and "Deer Area." To this day, the land hosts plenty of both.

I filmed the turtle's journey across the yard with a heavy old video camera, and there are a few terrible sequences where I'm moving or changing cameras when the batteries failed. My daughter, Johanna, edited the film and added music, and it does give the feeling of a journey. I hope to show the turtle video at our last service in May, which will center around our Flower Ceremony.

As with all beings, our journeys take many turns, some in response to features of earth and life, and some generated by our thoughts, emotions, desires and imaginations. Being at a moment when my call to ministry has met with the moving stream of my "call" or responsibilities to my parents, this will soon be a place where I will make yet another of life's turns. Your forgiving, patient, and generous hearts have allowed these many years and, in particular, recent months to feel like a blessing, and not a burden. The work of ministry requires some clarity and desk-centered discipline, which I don't have a lot of at this point, but the necessity of sitting down to organize my thoughts for a sermon, a *Quest* letter, a long email or a phone call, has been a great help, and something I love to do...once I actually sit down.

As I often do, I will end this letter with my greatest thanks to all of our UUFSC members and friends, all those who were with us, supporting and nurturing this Fellowship before my years of ministry, all who have been with us since. That includes your stories, your caring, your families, dogs, cats, all your animals, trees, gardens, nearby waters, your brilliant and curious and studious minds, your gifts of leadership and hard work, your Sunday programs, your music, your presence, your provisions, your generous hearts, and, most especially, your kindness and good humor, which, as much as all other things, create the beauty that feeds the world so that it can, and will, jump up and live again.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Members and Friends,

As our service year draws to a close in June, I reflect back on this past year's challenges and changes.

Perhaps the biggest change will be the retirement of our beloved minister, Rev. Mary Tiebout, who has been such an integral part of our Fellowship for 15 years. It will be a challenge to find a new minister who will match Mary's caring and commitment.

But the good news is that, as of this writing, the New Minister Search Committee has interviewed several qualified candidates. We were concerned that it might be difficult to attract someone to a part-time position in our small Fellowship. So, to have four applicants is a testimony to the special community that UUFSC is.

That view of the vibrancy of our Fellowship was reinforced recently when Hal Cohen and I attended a UUA webinar focused on small congregations. Quite a few of the attendees spoke of declining membership and attendance during the pandemic. Yet our UUFSC attendance, both when we were strictly virtual and now that we hold hybrid services, has been steady. To me, that demonstrates that our “beloved community” is important to us and has been a source of support during the uncertainties of the COVID pandemic.

This pandemic has been a major challenge during the past service year. The decision to resume in-person services last fall, only to revert to purely virtual services for several months when there was a new COVID surge, was difficult. We are all grateful to Hal Cohen and Phil Schaming for implementing our successful virtual platform. But this challenge has brought about a valuable change in that hybrid services now will be an ongoing part of our Sundays, allowing members who are not able to be at UUFSC in person to still participate.

Religious Education (RE) has been another challenge, as we were forced to suspend it during the pandemic and now must recruit a new Director of RE, as Lauren Jones-Rabbitt decided, for personal reasons, not to return after several years of dedicated and creative work. We are very fortunate that Olivia Smith has stepped in as the Interim RE Manager so that we've been able to resume RE, which is so important to our future.

Yes, it has been a year of challenges and changes. UUFSC has managed them and, if anything, has become a stronger community.

MINISTER CANDIDATES

Since our letter of April 24 regarding the minister search, there's been one change--one candidate has withdrawn her application from consideration, as she was offered another position. However, we still have two strong candidates, **Rev. Kim Wilson** and **Rev. Don Garrett**. Brief bios of each candidate follow. The candidates are scheduled to come to UUFSC in the next two weeks to give a sermon, and you're encouraged/invited to participate in these visits. Both services will also be online.

On **Sunday May 1 and May 8**, Rev. Wilson and Rev. Garrett, respectively, will be leading the services at our regular 10:30 hour. A Meet-and-Greet Coffee Hour will follow to give everyone an opportunity to meet the candidates. We ask everyone to wear a name tag both Sundays. A short feedback form will be available to relay your impressions to the search committee. (The feedback form will be emailed to those attending online so they may provide input, if they wish.) The Saturday service has been canceled, as we were able to move Rev. Garrett's visit to a Sunday.

Please join us in giving the minister candidates a warm UUFSC welcome. If you have any questions, please feel free to talk to anyone on the Minister Search Committee (Jeff Wallis, Chair, Susan Felsen, Barbara Kelly, and Sally Sattin).

Rev. Kim Wilson is a lifelong Unitarian Universalist with 20+ years' experience as a parish minister. Most recently, she was the contract minister for 9½ years at the UU Fellowship of the Poconos in Stroudsburg, PA. She has a Master of Divinity from the Moravian Theological Seminary in Bethlehem, PA. Her stated overarching goals of ministry are to transform lives, minds, and spirits through worship services and preaching, pastoral care, religious education, and all other aspects of the life of a congregation.

Rev. Don Garrett has a Master of Divinity from Duke Divinity School and has been a Unitarian Universalist minister since 2003. He's currently the contract minister at the UU Fellowship of Newark, Delaware. Previously, he was the minister for nine years at the UU Church of the Lehigh Valley in Bethlehem, PA. He describes his ministerial and leadership style as collaborative. He facilitates cooperation and involvement through interaction and example, while working to empower lay leadership and encourage participation in all areas of parish life.

UUFSC HISTORY ACCORDING TO BILL BENNETT

Bill Bennett has sent more remembrances of UUFSC activities and members. Here are some excerpts.

Our Fellowship was started by a number of people, and I hope I have included everyone. Joan and Norton Karp were very active. Clare and Paul Callender, Rhoda Bell, Florence and Paul Lighty, Marilyn Chapman, Linda Hendrixson, Debbie Rice, and Alexis and Jerry Tomlinson were also early, active members. Michael Busche was our attorney. They met in a Newton school, the Sparta Library, and the Sparta Ambulance Squad prior to leasing, then purchasing, the Grange building, our current home.

Judith Kohlbach Fulton, a long-time Fellowship member, was gracious enough to let me write this for *The Quest*, and we hope you enjoy it. Judith had a “bucket list” of 100 things she wanted to do in her lifetime, and one was a visit to Antarctica. Off she went, and the leader of her group asked each person to state their name and share a little about themselves. Judith shared that riding in a glider was on her list, and Al Fulton came over to her and mentioned that, if she ever got to Redlands, California, he would give her a ride in his. She took him up on it, which eventually ended up with them marrying in the chapel on Star Island*. I offered to take care of the flowers in the chapel, which I did with Mary’s suggestions. A wonderful wedding and reception were enjoyed by us all.

Why are Mary and Bill Unitarians? Mary was brought up in the Apostolic Christian Church and despised their teachings. I was brought up Lutheran, but rarely attended church. When we were married, we tried several different churches, and decided to join the Baptist church. We were advisors to the lively youth group, and I volunteered as Scoutmaster for a troop that had been sponsored by the church for 50 years. We were baptized again, dunked in the large tank in front of the church, and I thought, “What am I doing?” On the way home, we decided to look for a new church, which ended up being the Central Unitarian Church in Paramus. It was exactly what we were looking for, and we were members there for 32 years before moving to Hardwick and joining our Fellowship.
